# I. The Church's beginning. Acts 18:1-8

Some of the issues Paul heard about in Corinth: divisions, divorce, sexual sins, food offered to idols, the exercise of spiritual \_\_\_\_\_\_ in the church, and the collection for the poor.

- II. The writer of the letter. 1 Corinthians 1:1

"**By the will of God**"; Jesus equips and enable us to do \_\_\_\_\_\_ He calls us to.

- III. The Church of God. 1 Corinthians 1:2
- 1. The "*Church of God* "; Paul wrote this letter to the local of believers at Corinth.

Every person who has received Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior since Pentecost in *Acts 2*, when the Holy Spirit came upon believers, becomes a

2. ...which is at Corinth

## 3. ...to those who are sanctified in Christ Jesus.

In Christ, we are sanctified and have a perfect standing with God; confirmed by the Holy Spirit and the \_\_\_\_\_\_ of God.

## 4. ...called to be saints.

Biblically, every person who places their trust and hope in Jesus' free gift of salvation, \_\_\_\_\_\_ by His death and resurrection, is a *saint*.

## IV. Paul's typical greeting. 1 Corinthians 1:3

It is God's *grace* that gives the spiritual position to the believer, so once they are identified with Christ, they are able to draw on the \_\_\_\_\_\_ of Christ for power with their own daily living.
